



## **203** GAR individuals 106 family units


16 individuals or 6 units
were self transfers from other provinces to BC





- 58 individuals or 29% were children and youth under 18 years old;
- 8% or 17 youth were between 13 and 18 years old;
- 12% or 25 children were between 6 and 12 years old;
- 8% or 16 children were under 6 years;
- 8 individuals or 4% were 65 and above.

We have begun to receive some Syrian refugees but there is no indication (at the time of this publication) from CIC as to how many Syrian refugees are projected to be resettled to BC over the next several years. CIC has not responded yet with its pledge to the February 2014 UNHCR special appeal for 100,000 Syrian resettlement spaces over the next two years beginning in 2015

92 are projected to July arrive so far in

including **56** individuals from Iran, **27** from Iraqi, **4** from Syria, **2** from Palestine, **2** from Cuba and **1** from Afghanistan

ISSofBC recently released a research report entitled "Karen Refugees After Five Years in Canada: Readying Communities for Refugee Resettlement". This report examines the settlement

outcomes of the Karen community five (5) years after arrival in Canada as well as highlights some key elements needed before destining GARs to non-traditional destining communities. You can find
