


Top **5** source countries







Age breakdown













Looking ahead

- » Minister Mendicino announced that Canada would increase the number of Government Assisted Refugees to 12,500 each year from 2021–2023. BC historically takes around 12% although IRCC and the BC Government have not finalized this year's target;
- » As in 2020, due to the continued impact of **Covid** worldwide, **GAR** arrival numbers this year may continue to be impacted;
- » The necessity of maintaining **14 day self-isolation** guidelines for incoming **GAR**s will continue to impact the length of stay in transition housing and arrival flows from abroad;
- » Source countries are likely to remain the same from primarily the Middle East and Eastern Africa Regions; and,
- » The City of **Surrey will likely remain the #1 destination** within Metro Vancouver for **GAR** permanent housing.
